

DR. ROBERT REID



Bob Reid was born in Swift Current in 1917 and moved to Regina as a youngster. He began golfing there and became the Saskatchewan Junior Champion in 1934. While attending the University of Toronto School of Dentistry he won the 1937 and 1938 Intercollegiate Golf Championship - the first westerner to do so.

Bob saw six years of active service in World War II and was a member of the 1945 Canadian Army golf team overseas. Starting in 1946 he lived and practised dentistry in Prince Albert, where he was known as “Dr. Bob”.

Bob Reid was the Saskatchewan Amateur Champion in 1936, 1941, 1946, 1950, and 1952, playing on the Willingdon Cup team six times. During amateur match play he compiled an amazing record of 36 victories with only five defeats. At the provincial long-driving contest, he won every time he entered between 1936 and 1946. Competing in the 1952 Canadian Open he had the third lowest amateur score.

Moving into seniors, Bob won the Saskatchewan Senior Men’s Championship in 1973 and 1976.

He is a member of both the Saskatchewan and Prince Albert Sports Halls of Fame.
Dr. Bob Reid died in December 1994.
